

Attendance and Punctuality this week







Holidays in term time will <u>not</u> be permitted. Please ensure your child is present the last day of the term and the first day of a new term.

These are checked by the Educational Welfare Officer who will be visitng the school this term.

Punctuality is checked too. Unfortunately, a number of children are persistently arriving late to school. 5 minutes late every day means missing 3 days of school every year. The gates open at 8:30am and the school day starts at 8:50am. Pupils arriving after this time are recorded as 'late' and any pupil arriving after the register closes is marked 'absent'. Persistent lateness may trigger investigation by the Educational Welfare Officer.

Please remember that medical, dental and optician's appointments, should whenever possible, be arranged outside of school hours. If this is not possible, please ensure your child is at school in time for registration, both in the morning and after lunch. This means that your child must be in school until 9.30am in the morning and must not leave school before 2pm in the afternoon.

Punctuality



5 minutes late every day means missing 3 days of school every year.

The doors open at 8.40am and the children must be in class by 8.50am when the register is taken. Pupils arriving after this time are recorded as 'late' and any pupil arriving after the register closes is marked 'absent'.

Persistent lateness may trigger investigation by the School's Education Social Worker.
