Title	Charging Policy
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1. Statement of intent

St. Theresa's School is committed to ensuring equal opportunities for all pupils, regardless of financial circumstances, and has created this policy to ensure we adhere to legal requirements regarding charging for school activities and meet all statutory guidance provided by the DfE.

The school will ensure that this policy is published on its website and provides the school community with details of activities for which the school will charge parents, and the circumstances in which we will waive any charge parents would otherwise expect to pay.

2. Legal framework

- 2.1. This policy will have consideration for, and be compliant with, the following legislation and statutory guidance:
- DfE 'Maintained schools governance guide'
 - DfE 'What maintained schools must or should publish online'
 - Education Act 1996
 - Children Act 1989
 - The Charges for Music Tuition (England) Regulations 2007
 - DfE 'Charging for School Activities'
 - Freedom of Information Act 2000

3. Definitions

For the purposes of this policy, the following definitions will be used:

Charge: a fee payable for specifically defined activities

Remission: the cancellation of a charge, partly or wholly, which would normally be payable.

4. Charging for education

- 4.1. The Governors will not charge parents for:
- Admission applications.
 - Education provided during school hours (including the supply of any materials, books or other equipment).

- Education provided outside school hours if it is part of the national curriculum, part of a syllabus for a prescribed public examination that the pupil is being prepared for by the school, or part of religious education.
 - Instrumental or vocal tuition, unless provided at the request of the pupil's parents.
- 4.2. The Governors will charge parents for the following:
- Materials, books, instruments or equipment, where they desire their child to own them
 - Optional extras (the school will seek parental consent and willingness to meet these charges before any bookings are finalised)
 - Music and vocal tuition which is not prescribed as part of the National Curriculum and is requested by the parents
 - Use of community facilities (hiring of school premises)
 - Attendance at Breakfast clubs and After School clubs
 - Damage to, or loss of, school books and equipment
 - Wilful damage to school property and neighbouring property
 - Extra Nursery Hours over and above the 15 or 30 hours free entitlement (as appropriate)
 - Provision of information within the scope of freedom of information

5. Optional extras

- 5.1. We may charge parents for the following optional extras:
- Education provided outside of school time that is not:
 - Part of the national curriculum
 - Part of a syllabus for a prescribed public examination that the pupil is being prepared for at the school
 - Religious education
 - Examination entry fees where the pupil has not been prepared for the examinations at the school
 - Transport, other than that required to take the pupil to school or to other premises where the LA has arranged for the pupil to be provided with education.
 - Board and lodging for a pupil on a residential visit
 - Extended day services offered to pupils (Breakfast Clubs, After School Clubs)
- 5.2. When calculating the cost of optional extras, the school will only take into account the following:
- Materials, books, instruments or equipment provided in relation to the optional extra
 - The cost of buildings and accommodation
 - The employment of non-teaching staff
 - The cost of teaching staff (including teaching assistants) under contracts for services purely to provide an optional extra
 - The cost, or an appropriate proportion of the costs, for teaching staff employed to provide vocal tuition or tuition in playing a musical instrument, where the tuition is an optional extra.
- 5.3. The school will not charge in excess of the actual cost of providing the optional extra divided by the number of participating pupils.
- We will not charge a subsidy for any pupils wishing to participate but whose parents are unwilling or unable to pay the full charge.
- If a proportion of the activity takes place during school hours, we will not charge for the cost of alternative provision for those not participating.
- The school will not charge for supply teachers to cover the teachers who are absent from school accompanying pupils on a residential visit,

- 5.4. Participation in any optional activity will be on the basis of parental choice and a willingness to meet the charges. Therefore, parental agreement is a pre-requisite for the provision of an optional extra where charges will be made.
- 5.5. If a charge is to be made for a particular activity, such as optional extras, parents will be informed of how the charge will be calculated

6. Voluntary contributions

Although there is no obligation for any family to pay, the Governors reserve the right to request voluntary contributions for the following:

- Activities during school hours, e.g. visiting theatre groups, day visits and school journeys.
- Swimming lessons
- School Building Fund

If an activity cannot be funded without voluntary contributions, we will make this clear to parents at the outset. We will also make it clear that there is no obligation for parents to make a contribution, and notify parents whether assistance is available.

No child will be excluded from an activity simply because their parents are unwilling or unable to pay. If a parent is unwilling or unable to pay, their child will still be given an equal opportunity to take part in the activity. If insufficient voluntary contributions are raised to fund an activity, and the school cannot fund it via another source, the activity will be cancelled and this will be made clear to parents.

7. Music tuition

- 7.1. Music tuition is the only exception to the rule that all education provided during school hours must be free. The Charges for Music Tuition (England) Regulations 2007 allow for charges to be made for vocal or instrumental tuition provided either individually or to groups of any size – provided that the tuition is at the request of the pupil's parents.
- 7.2. The charges will not exceed the cost of the provision, including the cost of the staff providing the tuition.
- 7.3. Charging will not be made if the teaching is an essential part of the national curriculum.
- 7.4. Charging will not be made if the teaching is provided under the first access to the KS2 Instrumental and Vocal Tuition Programme.
- 7.5. No charge will be made in respect of pupils who are LAC.

8. Transport

- 8.1. We will not charge for:
 - Transporting registered pupils to or from the school premises, where the LA has a statutory obligation to provide the transport.
 - Transporting registered pupils to other premises where the governing board or LA has arranged for pupils to be educated.
 - Transport provided for an educational visit.

9. Residential visits

- 9.1. We will not charge for:
 - Education provided on any visit that takes place during school hours.
 - Education provided on any visit that takes place outside school hours if it is part of the national curriculum, part of a syllabus for a prescribed public examination that the pupil is being prepared for at the school, or part of religious education.
 - Supply teachers to cover for teachers accompanying pupils on visits.

- 9.2. We may charge for board and lodging – but the charge will not exceed the actual cost.
- 9.3. Parents will be exempt from board and lodging costs if they can prove that they are in receipt of one or more of the following benefits:
- Income Support
 - Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
 - Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
 - Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
 - The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit
 - Child Tax Credit, provided that they are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190
 - Working Tax Credit run-on – paid for four weeks after they stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
 - Universal Credit – if they apply on or after 1 April 2018, their household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits they receive)

10. Education partly during school hours

The school will follow the DfE guidance when determining whether an activity is deemed to take place during school hours or not, as set out below:

In the case of non-residential activities:

- 10.1. If 50 percent or more of the time spent on an activity occurs during school hours (including time spent travelling if the travel occurs during school hours), it is deemed to take place during school hours and no charge will be made.
- 10.2. Whatever the start and finish times of the school day, regulations require that the school day is divided into two sessions. School hours do not include the break in the middle of the day.

If less than 50 percent of the time spent on an activity occurs during school hours, it is deemed to have taken place outside school hours and we may charge for the activity; however, we will not charge if the activity is part of the national curriculum, part of a syllabus for a prescribed public examination that the pupil is being prepared for at the school, or part of religious education. Where a visit is residential, the number of school sessions covered by the visit is equal to or greater than 50 percent of the number of half days (any period of 12 hours ending with noon or midnight on any day) spent on the visit, we will not charge for the activity.

The remission of charges for board and lodging payments is the responsibility of the school. These costs will be borne by our contingency funds.

Any charges for extended day services will be optional.

11. Damaged or lost items

- 11.1. The school may charge for the cost of replacing items that are damaged or lost due to the negligence or poor behaviour of pupils or their parents. Parents will only be charged the replacement cost to purchase the same or equivalent item. The school will consider waiving costs in exceptional circumstances, e.g. financial hardship.

12. Remissions

- 12.1. We have set aside a small fund to enable families in financial difficulty to send their children on visits/activities. The funding is limited and there is no guarantee that all requests can be met. Assistance will be allocated on a needs basis, and if the full cost of the trip/activity cannot be met through assistance funding and voluntary contributions, the trip/activity will be cancelled.
- 12.2. Parents in receipt of any of the following benefits may request assistance with the costs of activities:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, provided that they are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and they have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190
- Working Tax Credit run on – paid for four weeks after they stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit.
- Universal Credit – if they apply on or after 1 April 2018, their household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits they receive)

12.3. To request assistance, parents should contact the Headteacher.

13. School trip refunds

- 13.1. All initial deposits for school trips will be non-refundable. Parents will be informed of this when they are provided with initial information about the trip.
- 13.2. In the event that the school has to cancel a trip due to foreseen circumstances, parent contributions will be refunded.
- 13.3. In the event that a school trip is cancelled due to unforeseen circumstances, it is at the Headteacher's discretion as to whether a refund is given to parents. The Headteacher will consult the Governing Body on the matter, taking into account the cost to the school, including alternative provision cost.
- 13.4. In the event that a school trip is postponed due to unforeseen circumstances, it is at the Headteacher's discretion as to what happens with the parental contributions for the trip. The Headteacher will discuss options with the Governing Body, which could include carrying forward the money until the trip takes place, transferring the money to another trip, or refunding parents.
- 13.5. In the event that the decision is made to postpone a trip due to foreseen circumstances, it is at the Headteacher's discretion as to what happens with the parental contributions for the trip. The Headteacher will discuss options with the Governing Body, which could include carrying forward the money until the trip takes place, transferring the money to another trip, or refunding parents.
- 13.6. In the event that a pupil or their parents cancel the pupil's place on a trip, it is at the Headteacher's discretion as to whether a refund is given. The Headteacher will consult the Governing Body on the matter, taking into account the reason for cancellation, whether the school will be reimbursed for the pupil's place on the trip, and whether the place on the trip can be offered to another pupil.
- 13.7. In the event that a pupil cannot attend a trip at the last minute, e.g. due to illness, it is at the Headteacher's discretion as to whether a refund is given. The Headteacher will consult the Governing Body on the matter, taking into account whether the school will be reimbursed for the pupil's place on the trip and whether the place on the trip can be offered to another pupil.
- 13.8. Excess expenditure will be subsidised by the school fund.
- 13.9. The school will deal with cancellations and refunds on a case-by-case basis, ensuring that all pupils and their families are treated equally.
- 13.10. If a parent wishes to make a complaint about refunds, they can do so via the school Complaints Policy.

14. Freedom of Information Policy and Publication Scheme

The school's Freedom of Information policy and Publication Scheme sets out where fees may be charged for the provision of information.
